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Dear fellow parishioners and friends,

We had a wonderful annual meeting with lots of good news and plans for the future. Our budget is looking better. We are making plans for temporary priests, and then hiring a new priest, probably part-time. There are plans for finding a new organist. Sunday School is going to continue and so is our adult formation including Bible Study on Wednesday mornings and learning opportunities after church on Sundays. The Sandwich Board has new "green" dishes that can be washed and reused for years.

But, we still have some uncertainty ahead of us. How will services feel without a regular priest every Sunday? Will be able to find the right priest to fit our needs? And an organist?

Part of what I feel is my job during this year is to remind us of what Bishop Lee said to us during his visit here. Trinity is full of people who love Jesus. Again and again in Wednesday morning Bible Study, we talk about passages that reinforce this. God's time is not our time. We have to trust in Him or all will be lost. We must love each other and show Jesus' love in

our lives or else we will founder. I pray that as we continue through the year, we will all remain steadfast in God's love and grace. Even when things seem dark, His bright love for us is there. Bask in it, and know you, and all of God's people, are loved.

How did we get in this mess anyway?

This is my recollection of the history of Trinity's Financial woes since I joined Trinity in 1991 – Rob Borchert

In 1991, when I joined Trinity our budget was in the neighborhood of \$100,000 and already in trouble.

In 1994 or 1995, Trinity received a gift of almost \$200,000 from the estate of Ms. Pooley.

In or 1998, Father Burden moved into the apartment in the Church and the Housing fund was combined with the Pooley Fund.

Trinity used these two funds to fund budget deficits in all of the years since we received the Pooley funds.

In 2005, Bill Burden retired and Trinity was faced with two alternatives:

1. Hire a part time Priest or
2. Participate in the Lilly Program (Mustardseed Program) through the Diocese.

Trinity chose the Lilly Program and hired Charlie (A very wise choice by the way) in August of 2006.

In 2009 the combined Pooley/Housing fund was exhausted, the Lilly Foundation Subsidy expired and we were forced to borrow money against the Endowment Fund.

In 2010, we again had to borrow money against the Endowment Fund to pay our bills and in March the Finance Committee reported to the Vestry that the current financial path was unsupportable.

On 12/5/2010, Charlie accepts a position at St. Matthew's parish in Evanston.

On 1/11/2011 Trinity's Vestry approves its first balanced budget since before I joined the Church in 1991.

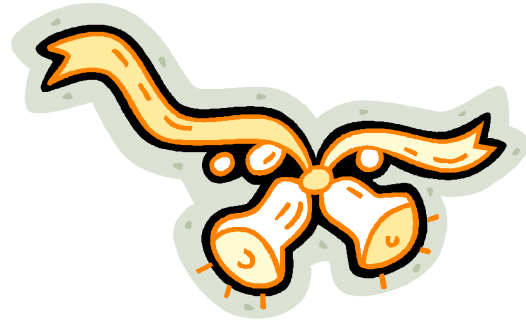
Parish Notes

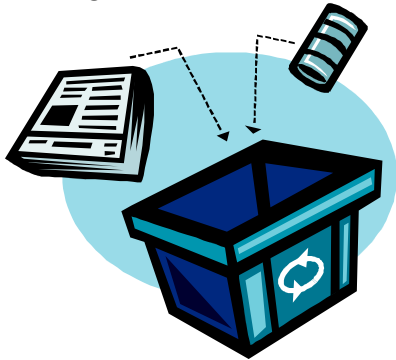
An Open Conversation with the

(This is a copy of the outline of a presentation at the Annual Meeting which presented what's been going on since we received Father Charlie's resignation)

1. Thanksgiving
 2. The Good News that the Bishop brought during his visit.
 - a. No intention of taking over Trinity to get our endowment.
 - b. The resources of the Diocese at our disposal as we go through our future planning
 - c. The naming of a liaison from the Diocese to help us in our becoming.
 - d. The bishop having several names in mind when thinking about possibly forming a supply Priest evolving into a part time priest.
 - e. That Father Rasicci, our Dean, has offered his assistance both Pastorally and in any way he can.
 - f. His belief that Trinity has a strong congregation doing the work of God
3. What your Vestry has already accomplished
 - a. A balanced 2011 Budget inclusive of;
 - i. Supply Priest coverage for the full year plus special services
 - ii. Funding for Organist replacement
 - iii. Reduction of our loan against the Endowment
 - iv. Money for day care weekly
 - b. Establishment of a search committee for a new organist
 - c. Contacting the Diocese to establish who our liaison with them will be
 - d. Establishment of a search committee for a supply Priest who would develop into a part time priest with a goal of having the person in place by next fall.
 - e. Establishing a Children's Education Committee to assure an ongoing educational effort.
 - f. Is developing a procedure to assure that the congregation's ongoing pastoral care needs are

- met after Father Charlie leaves.
- g. Coverage is already in place for Holy Week.
 - h. Anything else?
4. Open discussion of specific things the Congregation wants the Vestry to attend to.
 5. Request for the support of the Congregation through prayer, participation on committees, attendance at Vestry Meetings and belief that Trinity has a rich and glorious future!



The Recycle Bin

Hello everyone,

First I'd like to thank everyone for your participation in sending Valentine's to our elected officials regarding The Clean Air Act. I am very thankful to have the support of Trinity as we step forward into 2011. While I prepared for the mailing of the Valentine's I achieved one of the goals I stated at our annual meeting: compile a list of elected officials. Mission accomplished.

The Clean Air Act was established 40 years ago. It was to prevent harm to humans and the environment by controlling greenhouse gasses. According to Deb Weinstein at the Atlantic Wire "The Bill's supporters say the Environmental Protection Agency has used legislation such as the

1970 Clean Air Act for a power grab and is exercising authority it doesn't have. But the heart of the issue, apparently, is not that the EPA has overstepped its mandate, but that limiting greenhouse gasses hurts businesses. The bill wants to overturn limits on seven controlled emissions, including nitrous oxide, sulfur hexafluoride and hydrofluorocarbons and wants to prevent global warming from being considered a legitimate reason to limit emissions." For me, this means that if there is no clean air, deaths from these related issues increase and there will be more problems concerning global climate change. Therefore, an increase in deaths equals a decrease in business. Cleaner business is something that we can all, literally, live with.

The Green Team met before the annual meeting. We discussed the accomplishments of the previous year. With a lot of help from Linda, Rob, and Michael, the dishwasher was installed. As a result of the installation of the dishwasher we have already been able to reduce the amount of landfill waste by more than half! And the rain barrel is here and ready for spring. Don't forget about all of the wonderful things that we are learning about: endangered species, invasive species, and tips to reduce your carbon foot print. Anyone who wishes to come to a meeting is welcome too. If you are not able to come at our meeting time please let me know as we can try to better accommodate schedules.

At the annual meeting I spoke about the biggest environmental disaster of 2010. The BP oil spill was a horrifying gut check. It illustrated just how far we consumers push the limits of nature. In looking for images to share at the

annual meeting I was sick at the sight of what I had come across on the internet, photos of animals and habitats that had been completely destroyed by the oil spill. Not to mention the fishing industry that had come to a halt; the economy of these coastal towns that has hit rock bottom. Charles Darwin stated that “it’s not the strongest species that survives, nor the most intelligent that survives. It is the one that is most adaptable to change.” I feel that the oil spill was a change that no species is able to adapt. We live in an environment that is constantly changing. Natural environmental changes happen. And with these changes natural adaptation occurs. Major man-made disasters leave no room for adaptation, only destruction of species.

Recently I came across a documentary by Ken Burns called “Americas Best Idea, National Parks”. This was a great documentary I recommend it. It tells the story about how the idea of National Parks and National Monuments developed. Steven Mather was the first director of National Parks. Here is a quote I would like to share. I would like to ask the Green Team to ponder this and we can discuss it at the next meeting.

What is it that inspired the love of the flag? That tunes the ear of America to sing “My country tis of thee”. Is it Industrial efficacy? Irrigation statics or trade output? Is it the hideous ore dumps of the assorted mining camps? Is it the grim powerhouse camp that has harnessed Niagara? Is it the blackened waste that follows the devastation of much of our forest wealth? Is it the smoking factory of the grimy mill town? Is it even the lofty skyscraper that shuts out the sun and cast its dismal shadow over all below?

No, our devotion to the flag is inspired by the love of country. Patriotism is the religion of the soil and National Parks are our richest patrimony.

Rector’s Report to the 162nd Annual Meeting January 30, 2011

Good friends,

It’s been an honor, and a privilege, and most of all a joy, to walk humbly with our God with you since July 8th, 2006. As my father liked to say, I think we’ve “come a fur piece together.” Along the way, we’ve put new life into these old bones of this grand old lady.

Together, we’ve recognized and celebrated our rich and deep history with anniversaries of the church and of our ministries.

Together, we’ve put new life into these old bones physically, revisioning, rehabbing, and improving our buildings

and grounds. The plant has been continuously evaluated, maintained, restored and improved. There is not a room that has not been considered, not a wall that has been power-washed or painted, not a window that has not been fixed, stormed, restored, there's not a foot of roofing that has not been examined, and every inch needing it has been replaced.

Building on existing strengths, like the Sandwich Board, together, we've put new life into these old bones communally, by partnering with our neighbors, both in the neighborhood and in the city – annexing the resources of the political agencies, the social services, the community organizations, and the communities of faith, to build up God's kingdom. I'm thinking of: The Alpha Course. The Indian Creek Clean Up. Celebrate Jesus Together. The InterFaith Thanksgiving Services. The Crop Walk in 2008, 2009, and 2010. The Trinity Deacons.

Together we have strengthened our relationships with - and developed new ties to - the Diocese of Chicago, finding friends and supporters wherever we turned! And we have hosted events for the Diocese like the annual Chrism Mass, the Magnetic Church Conference, and the showing of the documentary *Traces of the Trade* right here at Trinity. Together we have found new sources of financial support beginning with our Sandwich Board Partners - like Grace Church, Hinsdale, and St. John's, Naperville - but also reaching out into the community finding supporters at the City of Aurora, the Kiwanis, Jewel/Osco, CROP, not to mention the Diocese of Chicago (with grants from the Lilly Program, the Congregations Commission, and the Hunger Commission), among others.

Together, we've put new life into these old bones socially, both in fundraisers like RibFest and Luigi's, and non-fundraisers, from game night to ice cream socials, from St. Margaret's lunches to countless pot-lucks such as this morning's!

We've put new life into her bones spiritually – with new services of worship like Taizé, stations of the cross, gospel service, children's services, lent, holy week, and advent services, healing services, weekly morning prayer. We've had services and special blessings for retirement, for major wedding anniversaries, for weddings, significant birthdays, including a Quinceañera. Our worship together has nurtured our pastoral care and fostered a hunger for spiritual formation. We began by teaching the children, with the Godly Play program. This yearning to know more spread to the adults, too, and we offered seasonal programs in Lent and Advent, which led to Sunday adult forums, which led to weekly bible studies – both *The Story* and the midweek lectionary bible study, and the quarterly book group study. We've studied with professors, and we've learned from each other.

We've put new life into her bones in ministries. Even as we reclaimed a particular spot in the Sandwich Board rotation, we imagined other ways we might respond to God's call to love kindness and to do justice. It has been a special pleasure, for instance, to watch as the Green Team has developed and grown and integrated itself into the life and ministries of the church.

Looking back, I realize that I have not done everything perfectly, far from it. I've made some mistakes, and some blunders were more damaging than others. At the same time, I've also left

undone some things that I should have done. For my many shortcomings and my faults, I ask your forgiveness. All in all, I still believe we have come a fur piece together. There is much more we could say, but once again I'm over time. So, with apologies to those people, events, and accomplishments that I've neglected to name, let me bring my piece home.

We have come to a crossroads, you and I. While my discernment has been difficult, God is very clearly calling me to take a new path, to bring what you've taught me to others. It is extraordinarily bittersweet to be standing in this place of transition. I will miss Trinity more than I can say. Thank you for the tremendous privilege of being your rector for these past five years. It's also pretty clear God has something new in store for Trinity. You are going somewhere where my presence would not be helpful. I believe, I hope, I pray that Trinity stands stronger today, more engaged today, more transparent, more alive and vibrant today, than when we first met. So now, it's time for me to step aside, and let the leadership - which has been trying its hand, working, growing, and developing - to take the reins.

I'll be here, but in the background, for a little while longer to help with the transition. I hope I can offer helpful advice and counsel for a few more weeks, as you find it helpful.

But now it's your turn.

Listen for God.

Believe in God's love for you and for Trinity.

There is, indeed, a very special place in God's Heart for Trinity!

You do extraordinary, and important ministry.

Take good care of yourselves.

And, for goodness sake, don't forget to have fun! (As if you could!)
